Anderson County Election Commission Minutes

**Thursday, February 12, 2026
4:00 p.m. ET, Room 118A, Courthouse**

The meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by Chair Jane Miller. In addition, to Miller, Commissioners David Bradshaw, Bill Gallaher, Marion Stanford and Bear Stephenson were present along with Administrator Stephens, Chief Deputy Kim Eby, Deputy Rivers Rogers, Deputy Shawn Rogers and Part Time Deputy Archie Liggett. Also attending were members of the public.

A motion was made by Bradshaw to approve the agenda. Stephenson seconded the motion with all voting in favor.

A motion was made by Gallaher to approve the minutes from 1/15/26 meeting. Bradshaw seconded the motion with all voting in favor.

There were public comments made by Chase Lindsey, Cathy Scarbrough and Robert Walker.

The next order of business was to set hours for Early Voting and Election Day on May 5, 2026. Commissioner Bradshaw made a motion to set the hours for early voting from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and Saturdays 9:00 a.m. until Noon and to set the hours for Election Day from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Stephenson seconded the motion and all commissioners voted in favor.

A motion was made by Stephenson for the Early Voting locations to be the Anderson County Fair Building, Midtown Community Center and the North Anderson County Government office. Bradshaw seconded the motion with all voting in favor.

The next order of business was to set the Election Day precinct locations. Commissioner Stanford voiced concerns about the accessibility of the Rosedale precinct at Scotty Phillips Grocery store. Administrator Stephens said that Louise McKown with the ADA Committee had signed off on it. Administrator Stephens also told the board that he had made a promise to the Rosedale Community to keep their voting location open.

Commissioner Bradshaw made a motion to approve the list of precincts with Commissioner Gallaher seconding the motion. Voting aye were Chair Miller, Commissioners Bradshaw and Gallaher. Voting no were Commissioners Stanford and Stephenson. The motion passed with a 3-2 vote.

Stephens distributed a proposed budget for the 2026-2027 Fiscal Year. After some discussion Bradshaw made a motion to submit the proposed budget to the Budget Committee. A second was made by Gallaher with all voting in favor.

Stephens introduced new hire, Archie Liggett, to the Commission. Archie will be working Part Time in the office.

Stephens said that he hoped to have two Democrat candidates for the open Machine Technician positions at the March meeting.

Stephens informed the Commission that the office had been undergoing equipment upgrades. New computers have been installed in the office. New printers will be coming soon.

Due to the State Republican Party rule concerning bonification of candidates, at least 6 candidates that had picked up petitions for the Republican Primaries had withdrawn those petitions and picked up petitions as Independents. Stanford asked when this rule went into effect. Stephens said it was in the 2024 Election cycle.

Stephens said that he would have an update on New and Proposed Legislation in the March meeting. One bill is proposing cutting the number of Early Voting days from 14 to 7.

Stephens said that the list of Poll Workers for the May election would be submitted to the Commission at the March meeting. Commissioner Bradshaw asked how it was going. Deputy Shawn Rogers said it was going well. However, we could use more Democratic workers.

Commissioner Stanford told the Commissioners that she had received a breakdown of attendees at the recent ETACEO seminar in Pigeon Forge. She said that 33 counties had registered for the conference with a total of 201

attendees. Of the 201 attendees, 33 were Administrator of Elections and 108 were Election Commissioners. She said that 16 of the 33 counties had all five Election Commissioners in attendance. She said that she would like to see everyone go to the next seminar.

The next order of business was locking the ballot boxes for Absentee, Early Voting and Nursing Home voting for the May election. All Commissioners participated in placing their respective party locks and numbered seals on each box.

The next meeting will be Thursday, March 12, 2026.

A motion to adjourn was made by Commissioner Gallaher with a second by Stephenson. All voted in favor and the meeting was adjourned at 4:56 p.m.

Anderson County Election Commission Minutes

Thursday, March 12, 2026
4:00 p.m. ET, Room 118A, Courthouse

The meeting was called to order at 4:01 p.m. by Chair Jane Miller. In addition, to Miller, Commissioners David Bradshaw, Bill Gallaher, Marion Stanford and Bear Stephenson were present along with Administrator Stephens, Chief Deputy Kim Eby, Deputy Shawn Rogers and Anderson County Mayor Terry Frank. Also attending were members of the public.

A motion was made by Stephenson to approve the agenda. Gallaher seconded the motion with all voting in favor.

Commissioner Bradshaw made a motion to approve the February minutes with a second from Gallaher. Commissioner Stanford said that the comments made by Administrator Stephens concerning the Rosedale precinct needed to be added to the minutes.

After some discussion, Commissioner Gallaher made a motion to amend the February Minutes to include the statement made by Administrator Stephens that he had made a promise to keep the Rosedale precinct open and that the precinct would not be shut down. A second was made by Bradshaw with all voting in favor.

There were public comments made by Martin May, Louise McKown, Mayor Terry Frank, Chase Lindsey, Marsha Livingston, Martin Zenni, Robert Walker, Roger Macklin, Liz McGeachy, Carolyn Boswell and Corben Nix.

Martin May made comments regarding County Commission, District 5 candidate Jeff Pack.

Louise McKown made comments about the Rosedale precinct regarding the ADA survey. Administrator Stephens said that he had received a copy of the recommended changes for each voting location that was submitted to Anderson County in 2022 or 2023 from Anderson County Mayor Terry Frank. Mayor Frank said that the county had a twenty year plan to make changes and that every three years an improvement update was given to the Tennessee Department of Transportation.

Gallaher made a motion to put the document in the minutes. A second was made by Bradshaw with all voting in favor. (Exhibit A)

Robert Walker made comments on the Budget process and the Rosedale precinct.

Chase Lindsey commented that it would be a good idea to record the Election Commission meetings and that supporting documents for agenda items should be in an agenda packet. Mr. Lindsey also gave Administrator Stephens an Open Records Request. Stephens told Lindsey that Andrew Stone was the Open Records Custodian and that it should go to him.

Marsha Livingston suggested that they could have put the revised oath language on the agenda.

Administrator Stephens informed the Commission of a revision in the Oath that appears on the application to vote, as required by TCA 2-7-115(b). The revised wording was sent to the Election Commission office on October 20, 2025 by TN Coordinator of Elections, Mark Goins (Exhibit B). A copy of the APPLICATION TO VOTE is attached (Exhibit C). Commissioner Stanford said that she had to look up the information on the revised oath. She said that the commissioners don't get things they need to see.

Zenni, Macklin, McGeachy, Boswell and Nix made public comments about the revised oath.

Stephens introduced Democratic Machine Technician candidates, Joe Jacobs and Martin Bauer, to the Commission. Commissioner Stephenson made a motion to approve Jacobs as a Machine Technician with a second from Stanford. Both Democratic Commissioners voted in favor. Commissioner Stanford made a motion to approve Bauer as a Machine Technician with a second from Stephenson. Both Democratic Commissioners voted in favor.

Administrator Stephens distributed the lists of candidates for the May, August and November elections to the Commission.

Administrator Stephens informed the Commission of a new City of Clinton sign ordinance. Stanford asked for a copy of the ordinance. Stephens said that he would provide her with a copy.

Administrator Stephens said that County Commission, District 2 candidate Ron Meredith had asked to change the way his name would appear on the May ballot. He would like to have it changed from Ronald C. Meredith, Jr. to “Ron Meredith”. Bradshaw made a motion to allow the requested name change with a second from Stephenson. All voted in favor.

The proposed poll worker list for the May election was distributed to the Commission by Administrator Stephens. A motion to approve the list was made by Bradshaw with a second from Gallaher. All voted in favor.

Chair Miller reminded the Commission to complete the annual Anderson County Government training by March 27, 2026 as requested by Human Resources.

The next meeting was set for Thursday, April 9, 2026 at 4:00 pm.

A motion to adjourn was made by Commissioner Stephenson with a second by Gallaher. All voted in favor and the meeting was adjourned at 5:08 p.m.

Subject: Revised Oath on Application for Ballot

As you prepare for the upcoming 2026 election cycle, particularly the upcoming primary elections, please see the revised language for the Application for Ballot.

I request a ballot to vote in this election and declare, under penalty of perjury, that I reside at the above address and am a registered and qualified voter in the precinct in which I am offering to vote. I also declare that I have not previously voted in this election, nor will I attempt to vote again in this election. If this is a primary election, I am a bona fide member of and affiliated with the political party in whose primary I seek to vote; or I declare allegiance to the political party in whose primary I seek to vote and state that I intend to affiliate with that party.

The language above must be used on absentee by-mail, early voting, and Election Day ballot applications. If you use electronic pollbooks, the language must also be added to the ballot applications produced by the e-pollbook.

This revised ballot application language comes from and quotes Tenn. Code Ann. § 2-7-115(b), which states the following:

A registered voter is entitled to vote in a primary election for offices for which the voter is qualified to vote at the polling place where the voter is registered if:

- (1) The voter is a bona fide member of and affiliated with the political party in whose primary the voter seeks to vote; or

(2) At the time the voter seeks to vote, the voter declares allegiance to the political party in whose primary the voter seeks to vote and states that the voter intends to affiliate with that party.

If you have a May county primary and your Election Day ballot applications are pre-printed, this language must be provided to your printer in time for the change to be made to the ballot applications, which will be used for that primary election.

Please review the application for ballot generated by your voter registration system and the one pre-printed by your printer to make sure that it contains the above language.

Thank you for the excellent job you have done and continue to do in the election process.

PRESIDENTIAL ACTIONS

ENSURING CITIZENSHIP VERIFICATION AND INTEGRITY IN FEDERAL ELECTIONS

Executive Orders

March 31, 2026

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, including the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (52 U.S.C. 20901 *et seq.*), the National Voter Registration Act of 1993 (52 U.S.C. 20501 *et seq.*), and the Federal Government's constitutional obligation to guarantee a republican form of Government to every State in the Union, U.S. Const. Art. IV, Sec. 4, it is hereby ordered:

Section 1. Purpose and Policy. The right to vote in Federal elections is reserved exclusively for citizens of the United States under the Constitution and Federal law. Federal statutes explicitly prohibit non-citizens from registering to vote or voting in Federal elections and impose criminal penalties for violations. (18 U.S.C. 241; 18 U.S.C. 611; 18 U.S.C. 1015; and 52 U.S.C. 20511). The Social Security Administration (SSA) maintains records that, in conjunction with the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) Systematic Alien Verification for Entitlements (SAVE) program under 42 U.S.C. 1320b-7, can assist in verifying identity and Federal election voter eligibility.

The Federal Government has an unavoidable duty under Article II of the Constitution of the United States to enforce Federal law, which includes preventing violations of Federal criminal law and maintaining public confidence in election outcomes. To enhance election integrity via the United States Mail, additional measures are necessary. Secure ballot envelope identifiers provide a reliable, auditable mechanism to enforce Federal law without unduly burdening or infringing on the rights of eligible voters. Unique ballot envelope identifiers, such as bar codes, enable confirmation that only citizens receive and cast ballots, reducing the risk of fraud and protecting the integrity of Federal elections.

Sec. 2. Establishment and Transmission of State Citizenship Lists and Prioritization of Investigations and Prosecutions Related to Election Fraud. (a) To the extent feasible and consistent with applicable law, including but not limited to the Privacy Act of 1974 (5 U.S.C. 552a), the Secretary of Homeland Security, through the Director of United States Citizenship and Immigration Services and in coordination with the Commissioner of SSA, shall take appropriate action to compile and transmit to the chief election official of each State a list of individuals confirmed to be United States citizens who will be above the age of 18 at the time of an upcoming Federal election and who maintain a residence in the subject State (State Citizenship List). The State Citizenship List shall be derived from Federal citizenship and naturalization records, SSA records, SAVE data, and other relevant Federal databases. The State Citizenship List shall be updated and transmitted to State election officials no fewer than 60 days before each regularly scheduled Federal election, or promptly upon request by a State in connection with any special Federal election. The Secretary of Homeland Security shall establish procedures to (i) allow individuals to access their individual records as well as to update or correct them in advance of elections; and (ii) enable States to routinely supplement and provide suggested modifications or amendments to the State Citizenship List transmitted thereto. An individual's identification on the State Citizenship List does not indicate that the individual has been properly registered to vote in the State. State and Federal laws and State procedures must still be followed for an individual to be registered to vote. There may be State laws, not reflected in the State Citizenship List, that preclude voter registration, or the individual may choose not to be registered.

(b) For purposes of this order, an individual is "eligible to vote in a Federal election" if the individual is a citizen of the United States, 18 years of age or older by the date of the upcoming election, and otherwise qualified under the laws of his or her State. The Attorney General shall prioritize the investigation and, as appropriate, the prosecution of State and local officials or any others involved in the administration of Federal elections who issue Federal ballots to individuals not eligible to vote in a Federal election, including under 18 U.S.C. 2(a), 18 U.S.C. 241, 18 U.S.C. 371, 18 U.S.C. 611(a), 18 U.S.C. 1001, 18 U.S.C. 1015, 52 U.S.C. 10307, and 52 U.S.C. 20511. Similarly, the Attorney General shall prioritize the investigation and, as appropriate, the prosecution of individuals and public or private entities engaged in, or aiding and abetting, the printing, production, shipment, or distribution of ballots to individuals who are not eligible to vote in a Federal election.

Sec. 3. United States Postal Service Rulemaking on Mail-In and Absentee Ballots. (a) The unlawful use of the mail in connection with elections is prohibited by various Federal statutes, including 18 U.S.C. 1341, 18 U.S.C. 1708, 52 U.S.C. 10307, and 52 U.S.C. 20511.

(b) To ensure the faithful execution of Federal law, protect the integrity of the mail as a medium for transmitting Federal election ballots and establish uniform standards for mail-in or absentee ballot services implemented through the United States Postal Service (USPS), the Postmaster General is hereby directed to initiate a proposed rulemaking pursuant to 39 U.S.C. 401 and other applicable authority within 60 days of the date of this order. The notice of proposed rulemaking shall include, at minimum, the following:

(i) Proposed provisions specifying that all outbound ballot mail must be mailed in an envelope that:

(A) is marked as Official Election Mail, including through designated markings provided by USPS for this purpose, such as the Official Election Mail logo, as necessary and appropriate;

(B) is automation-compatible and bears a unique Intelligent Mail barcode, or successor USPS technology, that facilitates tracking and is consistent with the other requirements of this section; and

(C) has undergone a mail envelope design review by the USPS to ensure compliance with USPS mailing standards, including barcode placement.

(ii) Proposed provisions specifying that, no fewer than 90 days prior to a Federal election, any State may choose to notify the USPS if it intends to allow for mail-in or absentee ballots to be transmitted by the USPS. As part of that notification, any notifying State should further indicate whether it intends to submit to the USPS, no fewer than 60 days before the election, a list of voters eligible to vote in a Federal election in such State to whom the State intends to provide a mail-in or absentee ballot to be transmitted via the USPS.

(iii) Proposed provisions specifying that the USPS shall not transmit mail-in or absentee ballots from any individual unless those individuals have been enrolled on a State-specific list described in subsection (b)(iv) of this section with the USPS pursuant to this subsection.

(iv) Proposed provisions specifying that the USPS shall provide each State with a list of individuals (Mail-In and Absentee Participation List) who are enrolled with the USPS, pursuant to a process specified in the rulemaking directed by this subsection, for mail-in or absentee ballots provided by such State, along with unique ballot envelope identifiers, such as bar codes, for mail-in or absentee ballots provided to such individuals. The preparation and transmission of each State-specific Mail-In and Absentee Participation List shall comply with the Privacy Act and all applicable use agreements.

(v) Proposed procedures enabling each State to routinely supplement and provide suggested modifications or amendments to the State's Mail-In and Absentee Participation List in advance of any Federal election, consistent with applicable State law.

(c) The USPS shall coordinate with the USPS Office of Inspector General and the Department of Justice for investigation of suspected unlawful use of the mail involving Federal election materials.

(d) Any final rule pursuant to this section shall be issued no later than 120 days from the date of this order.

Sec. 4. Implementation. (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security, the Commissioner of SSA, and the Postmaster General shall coordinate with the Secretary of Commerce in effectuating all relevant aspects of the implementation of this order.

(b) The Attorney General shall enforce compliance with the applicable Federal statutes referenced herein and provide guidance to election officials, including any instrumentalities thereof; contractors; individuals involved in the administration of Federal elections; or public or private entities engaged in the printing, production, shipment, or distribution of ballots.

(c) The Secretary of Homeland Security shall, within 90 days of the date of this order, establish the infrastructure necessary to compile, maintain, and transmit the State Citizenship List described in section 2(a) of this order, and shall designate a point of contact within DHS to receive and process requests from individuals and State election officials regarding the relevant State Citizenship List. The Commissioner of SSA shall provide all necessary citizenship and identity data to the Secretary of Homeland Security in support of this requirement, consistent with applicable law, the Privacy Act, and all applicable use agreements.

Sec. 5. Enforcement. The Attorney General and the heads of executive departments and agencies (agencies) with relevant authority shall take all lawful steps to deter and address noncompliance with Federal law, including withholding Federal funds from noncompliant States and localities where such withholding is authorized by law. Evidence of violations of existing Federal laws by State or local election officials; States or localities, including any instrumentalities thereof; contractors; individuals involved in the administration of Federal elections; or public or private entities engaged in the printing, production, shipment, or distribution of ballots may be referred to the Department of Justice for consideration of investigation or charges under 18 U.S.C. 2(a), 18 U.S.C. 241, 18 U.S.C. 371, 18 U.S.C. 611(a), 18 U.S.C. 1001, 18 U.S.C. 1015, 52 U.S.C. 10307, and 52 U.S.C. 20511. States and localities should preserve, for a 5-year period, all records and materials — excluding ballots cast — evidencing voter participation in any Federal election (e.g., ballot envelopes, regardless of carrier).

Sec. 6. Severability. If any provision of this order, or the application of any provision to any agency, person, or circumstance, is held to be invalid, the remainder of this order and the application of its provisions to any other agencies, persons, or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Sec. 7. General Provisions. (a) Nothing in this order shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:

(i) the authority granted by law to an executive department or agency, or the head thereof; or

(ii) the functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.

(b) This order shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations.

(c) This order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

SUMMARY OF BILL AS AMENDED (016383): Requires an individual to register as a member of a statewide political party or a recognized minor party, or to be designated as unaffiliated, at the time of initial registration. Authorizes a person, who was registered to vote prior to February 1, 2027, to designate the statewide political party or recognized minor party with which they intent to affiliate during the normal registration period. Requires the county election commission to record the voter’s party declaration or affirmation in the voter’s permanent record. Requires a voter who intends to participate in a primary election to notify the county election commission, in writing and with their original signature, if they wish to change their party affiliation no later than the end of the registration period for the election in which the voter wishes to participate. Specifies that if a recognized minor party fails to maintain recognition beyond the current election year, the county election commission must update the permanent voter registration record of any voter affiliated with that minor party to “unaffiliated”. Effective February 1, 2027.



<p>It is assumed that the updates to Department of Safety’s (DOS) voter kiosks will be accomplished by the relevant vendor under a current contractual provision at no additional cost to DOS. However, if that provision is exhausted by this and other legislation subsequently enacted, DOS may incur a one-time increase in expenditures of \$75,000 in FY26-27.</p>

Assumptions:

- Tennessee Code Annotated § 2-7-115(b) currently requires a voter to declare allegiance to the political party in whose primary the voter seeks to vote and state that the voter intends to affiliate with that party.
- In order to update and distribute voter registration applications to county election commissions, the Secretary of State (SOS) will incur a one-time increase in state expenditures of \$10,500 in FY26-27.
- According to the SOS's Division of Elections, a field indicating a voter's declared party affiliation will be added to the statewide voter registration database.
- In order to add party affiliation to the state voter registration database, it will take the entity contracted by the SOS approximately 50 hours, at a cost of \$90 per hour, for a total increase in state expenditures of at least \$4,500 (\$90 x 50 hours) in FY26-27.
- The updating of online voter registration forms will be performed by the Division of Election's online voter registration vendor and will result in a one-time increase in state expenditures of \$25,000 in FY26-27.
- The Department of Safety will require modification to its A-List system to allow for changes to the voter registration process in order to comply with the proposed legislation.
- To the extent that these A-List modifications can be accomplished within available resources provided under the current vendor contract, the modifications will not result in an increase in state expenditures; otherwise, those modifications could result in an additional one-time increase in state expenditures of up to \$75,000 in FY26-27.
- County election commissions will be required to update their voter registration records. While the majority of counties can accomplish this within existing resources, three counties will incur a mandatory one-time increase in local expenditures associated with this update:
 - Knox County will have a one-time increase in local of \$10,000 in FY26-27;
 - Davidson County will have a one-time increase in expenditures of \$19,000 in FY26-27; and
 - Shelby County will have a one-time increase in expenditures of \$93,750 in FY26-27.
- The total increase in state expenditures will be \$40,000 (\$10,500 + \$4,500 + \$25,000) in FY26-27 and a mandatory increase in local expenditures of \$122,750 (\$10,000 + \$19,000 + \$93,750) in FY26-27.
